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An Act respecting the Ontario Association of Home Inspectors

Preamble	<p>The Ontario Association of Home Inspectors has applied for special legislation to become incorporated for the purpose of carrying out its objects, to enable it to govern and discipline its members and to grant to its members the right to the exclusive use of the designations “Registered Home Inspector” and “R.H.I.”. The applicant represents that it is an unincorporated association that is a division of The Canadian Association of Home Inspectors.</p> <p>It is appropriate to grant the application.</p> <p>Therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:</p>	<p>consumers in Ontario by home inspectors;</p> <p>(f) to seek and maintain affiliations with, and to co-operate with, other organizations having objects, in whole or in part, the same as or similar to the objects of the Association.</p>	
		<p>4. Restoration to register

(2) Subject to subsection (3), the board of directors, on such grounds as it considers sufficient, may cause a name that was removed from the register to be restored to the register either without payment of a fee or upon payment to the Association of any arrears in fees or other sums the person owes to the Association and such additional sum as may be prescribed by by-law of the Association.

for rehearing, in whole or in part, in accordance with such directions as the court considers appropriate.

(3) If the name of a person whose registration has been suspended or revoked under clause (1) (d) is to be restored to the register, the board of directors may by resolution direct that the name be restored subject to such conditions as the board may impose.

12. (1) Every member of the Association whose name appears in the register may use the designations "Registered Home Inspector" and "R.H.I."

Certificate of membership

10. (1) The board of directors shall cause a certificate of membership to be issued each year to every person whose name appears in the register.

(2) Any person in Ontario who, not being a registered member of the Association, takes or uses the designation "Registered Home Inspector" or "R.H.I.", alone or in combination with any other word, name, title, initial or description, or implies, suggests or holds out that that person is a registered home inspector is guilty of an offence.

Same

(2) The certificate shall state the date upon which it expires, the category of membership and any condition imposed by the board of directors on the home inspection practice of the person to whom the certificate is issued.

(3) On conviction of an offence under subsection (2), a person is liable to a fine of not more than \$5,000.

Appeals

11. (1) A person who has been refused membership or who has been subject to a disciplinary sanction under the by-laws of the Association may appeal to the Divisional Court from the refusal to grant membership or from the sanction.

(4) In every case where registration is an issue, the production of a copy of the register, certified by the registrar of the Association, is sufficient evidence of all persons who are registered in lieu of the production of the original register and a certificate purporting to be signed by a person in that person's capacity as registrar is proof, in the absence of evidence to the contrary, that the person is the registrar without proof of that person's signature or of that person being the registrar.

Record

(2) Upon the request of a party desiring to appeal to the Divisional Court and upon payment of a reasonable fee, the registrar shall provide the party with a certified copy of the record of the proceeding being appealed, including the documents received in evidence and the decision or order that is the subject of the appeal.

(5) The absence of the name of any person from a copy of the register produced under subsection (4) is proof, in the absence of evidence to the contrary, that the person is not registered,

Grounds for appeal

(3) An appeal under this section may be made on questions of law or fact or both.

13. This Act does not affect or interfere with the right of any person who is not a member of the Association to practise as a home inspector in the Province of Ontario.

Powers of court

(4) The court may confirm, vary or rescind the decision being appealed, may exercise all powers of the Association or of its board of directors or committee, as appropriate, and may direct the Association, its board of directors or committee to take any action it is empowered to take and, for such purposes, the court may substitute its opinion for that of the Association or its board of directors or committee, or the court may refer the matter back

14. This Act comes into force on the day it receives Royal Assent.

15. The short title of this Act is the *Ontario Association of Home Inspectors Act, 1994*.
